Dominic Lash – *chord sequence with distortions* (2015) and *I shall say this only once* (2016)

This performance represents a simultaneous premiere of two pieces. *chord sequence with distortions* (2015) for violin is the fourth and last in a series of "chord sequence with..." solo pieces. Here the chord sequence is a gradual transition from unison to an open fifth, filtered through a series of distortions, determined systematically and then randomly permutated. *I shall say this only once* (2016) is for two players with any sound-producing objects they desire, and explores singularity and repetition, synchrony and independence. The two pieces have nothing to do with each other but I think they sound nice together.
